CLA(영국 복제권단체) 중앙정부와 새로운 이용허락 계약 체결

두 당사자는 협의 끝에 2016년 3월까지 존속하는 계약 체결에 합의 하였다. 이 계약으로 70개 이상의 부서 직원들의 저작물이용허락을 하였으며 잡지, 도서등의 복제(복사, 전송)가 허용된다. 이번 포괄계약은 그들이 필요한 만큼 저작물을 적법하게 복제 및 재이용을 허용함으로써 행정비용을 감소시키도록 하였다.

지식재산, 혁신 기술부 장관, Lord Younger는 "이 새로운 계약을 매우 환영하며 이 계약은 정부의 행정비용을 감소 시킬 뿐만 아니라 저작권자들에게 적법한 보상을 한다"고 말하였다.

CLA의 CEO Kevin Fitzgerald는 "이 새로운 계약은 정부 및 저작권자 뿐만 아니라 영국전체의 이익으로 돌아갈 것이다. 저작권료 수입은 창조산업에 영향을 줄것이며 이는 결국 경제발전으로 이어질 것이다."고 말하였다.

CLA agrees new licence for central government

The Copyright Licensing Agency (CLA) has reached agreement with the Cabinet Office on a new licence for Central Government.

10 February 2014

After extensive consultation both parties have agreed that a CLA licence will be in place until March 2016.

The licence covers employees across Central Government working in over 70 departments, crown bodies and related organizations. staff have the permissions they need to make copies from magazines, journals and books in either print or digital format, including some free

This single comprehensive pan-arrangement means reduced administration within government departments while also providing a uniform set of permissions for users allowing them the freedom to legally copy and re-use the published copyright material they need for much of their daily activity.

The licensing agreement achieves the dual aim of ensuring government employees enjoy continued access to the widest range of published information while copyright owners receive fair reward for the re-use of their intellectual property.

Lord Younger, Minister for Intellectual Property, Innovation and Skills, said:

"I welcome this new pan-Governmental licence. It not only represents good value for money for the Government and the taxpayer, but also it ensures that rights holders are properly remunerated for the use of their work."

Kevin Fitzgerald, Chief Executive of CLA, said of the agreement:

"This is great news for central government and copyright owners and is equally good news for the UK generally, as revenue generated from copyright licensing is known to incentivise the creative industries which help to drive economic growth."
